Outdoor Classroom and Shelter Appeal



Our Outdoor Classroom is currently under construction. This was financed with a £5,000 grant from the Garfield Weston Foundation and with £3,800 from the Co-op as a Community Partner.

We are grateful to all local Co-op shoppers who selected us as their community partner.

We are pleased to announce that we are continuing this partnership with the Co-op as we have been selected for their new set of local causes.

Over the next year, we are partnering with Co-op to create a garden on our site for growing fruit and vegetables for the children to eat. We will run a club to tend to it regularly and invite parents to work with their children. This will form part of our Eco Schools developments.

Healthy Eating

In our parent and carer survey, some parents raised questions about our school dinner menus - for example, why school dinners could include items like pizza and chocolate cake but packed lunches could not. The difference is due to the way that our caterers prepare school dinner items on site, compared to how processed food is prepared commercially.

Here, Caterlink provide further information:

Caterlink produces menus in line with the School Food Standards in order to ensure that all meals are nutritionally balanced, and that children are getting the energy and nutrients they require.

The desserts offered play an important role in ensuring that the children are getting enough energy from their lunchtime meal, to sustain them throughout the school afternoon. Children have high energy requirements for their size, in order to maintain body functions, be active and grow.

Whilst it is a national problem that children are consuming too many free sugars, it is important to recognise that sugar is part of a balanced diet. Caterlink are working hard to reduce the amount of free sugars in our dessert recipes, and have not only achieved but exceeded the government sugar reduction programme, with an average of only 4.5g of sugar in our desserts across the Autumn term (the government recommendation is 6.5g or lower). We have removed high sugar items off the menu, and used fresh and dried fruit to sweeten desserts instead of sugar.

In line with the School Food Standards, Caterlink provide at least two desserts each week that are made up of 50% fruit or vegetables, helping children to achieve their 5 a day. Milk based desserts are provided a couple of times per week. Milk based desserts offer high levels of calcium, for strong bones and teeth. Furthermore, the desserts contain high levels of other essential nutrients that children require, such as iron and zinc, both of which are important for good health and development.

Caterlink don't use any chocolate or confectionary within the desserts, in line with the School Food Standards. Our chocolate desserts only use cocoa powder, which is high in iron.

Caterlink's Sugar Reduction Programme – 4 Years On

We have reached the end of our 4th year of the sugar reduction project, and we can proudly say we have maintained our **67**% **reduction** in sugar throughout the year!

Thanks to Caterlink's fantastic teams, we have continued to reformulate recipes and remove high-sugar ingredients and products from our menus.

We actively **encourage more fresh fruit** across all menus and are committed to continue to reduce free sugars throughout.

Any child eating in a Caterlink primary school can be sure that they are having healthy lunches which contain 33% less free sugars on average than the government recommendations.


